Mandate: Classis Huron Safe Church Committee is mandated:

- 1. To function as an Abuse Response Team according to Synodical Guidelines (as annotated for Classis Huron).
- 2. To provide comprehensive and on-going education and support to our churches in the prevention of and response to abuse.
- 3. To provide support to our churches in the prevention of, and response to abuse.

"We are living through unprecedented and confusing times – forced to forego the things that usually give structure and meaning to our lives. And while we experience these changes as individuals and families, we're also witnessing and experiencing the unveiling of the stark racial injustices and economic inequalities of our larger cultural systems.

The Impact of a Pandemic on Gender-Based Violence (Review)

On March 6, Classis Huron Safe Church Committee hosted the 22nd Annual Inter-Classis Safe Church conference. The conference is held each year on the first Saturday in March at Waterloo CRC. This year, in light of the pandemic, it was hosted online. Participants joined from Classis Chatham, Huron, Eastern Canada, Quinte, Hamilton, Toronto, Niagara, Grand Rapids South, and Holland. The conference featured "Unmute", a forum theatre event that explored with an audience, ways to respond to a situation of domestic violence. The event was chosen because of its relevance during COVIC-19 which has put added pressure on families and relationships. Holding the event was important to our committee, not only to stay connected, but also to fulfill our Classis Huron Safe Church mandate which requires that we provide annual and ongoing training."

As a denomination, we have designated every fourth Sunday in September: Abuse Awareness Sunday. We invite every congregation to plan their worship service, litany, and sermon/message around the theme of abuse awareness. The 2021 theme for Abuse Awareness Sunday is "**Safe Church Ministry: Not just a Policy, a Way of Being the Church**". While these are certainly helpful, Safe Church would like to invite churches to imagine a more holistic approach to nurturing a safe and healthy church community where abuse itself becomes unthinkable and where survivors feel supported and safe.
