This winter, I had the pleasure of planning Weekend Escape Events for WCM. These events were designed to be inclusive and enjoyable for all skill levels, a place for fostering community among believers while offering a welcoming, comfortable space for those who don't yet know Christ. In today's world, casual community-building events are more important than ever. Research by Domènech-Abella et al. (2019) shows that loneliness can significantly increase feelings of anxiety and depression. Through planning these events, I witnessed firsthand how creating meaningful connections can have a real impact—equipping people with tools to combat loneliness not only during the school term but also beyond.

Board game nights were especially popular this term. These events encouraged friendly competition and offered a unique space for bonding, allowing sides of people to emerge that don't typically show during Table Talk gatherings. The relaxed, playful atmosphere helped attendees feel comfortable being themselves—even a little goofy—which fostered a sense of camaraderie. This camaraderie carried over into Table Talk events, creating a safe space for people to share vulnerable thoughts and ideas about their faith, and deepening connections between both believers and those still exploring faith.

I felt deeply encouraged as relationships strengthened throughout the term, sparked by these simple yet meaningful weekend events. After all, God created us for community and to experience joy. This term, I truly felt that God used me as a vessel to help build that community and share in the joy that comes from deepening relationships with one another.

Over the Winter of 2025, I had the honour of leading a small group Bible study challenge for WCM. Our goal was to read the New Testament in 60 days—and we did! We would read approximately 4-5 chapters a day and meet once a week to discuss what we had learned or what we were struggling to understand. Framing the challenge with 2 Timothy 3:14-17, we set out to spend more time in God's Word, to have him speak to us, to gain peace amidst the business of school, to develop Godly habits, and to hold each other accountable through it all.

When it was all over, one student simply remarked that she was impressed she had completed the challenge. Another said he learned how important accountability was through this challenge, while others commented that they had learned discipline. I think all of us were better able to see the big picture of the New Testament and understand the story of Scripture because we were reading through it in such a short time. A lot of us also felt that starting the challenge was difficult but by the end we looked forward to that time spent with God every day.

None of us were biblical experts, but we learned so much from reading and from each other. It was a blessing to hold my peers accountable in their faith walks and to have them do the same for me.

F & S Book Club Group

About every two weeks, a small group of Christian faculty and staff (as well as a few extras) from Laurier and Waterloo have met for many years to discuss a book. I have been part of this group since 1985. It has been led by the Christian Reformed campus minister, now Melissa. The first rule is that we have a lot of fun having very lively discussions. This year we read "Jesus and the Powers" by N.T. Wright and Michael F. Bird, a very good choice in these turbulent times. The hypothesis explored was whether liberal democracy is the best form of government, dare I say even the "Christian" form of government. Even within liberal democracy, there are many challenges faced by a believer exercising their faith in a political world.

The second term saw us read "Grace Abounds: God's Abundance Against the Fear of Scarcity" a series of writings by Walter Brueggemann edited by Davis Hankins. This was the first time I had read Brueggemann although I had heard much about him over the years. One of the wonderful part of this group is that you read books you might never choose to read yourself. The first half of this book tried hard to integrate the Old Testament narratives into modern concepts of economics (full acknowledgement, I am a former economics professor). This was a tough sell to the group. The second half of the book emphasized the proper response to God's abundance found in the Old Testament and the links to those responses in the New Testament. I rarely leave our meeting without at least one piece of wisdom from this group to carry me through until the next meeting.
